Rethinking Négritude through Léon-Gontran Damas analyses four cases in which Damasian Négritude shifted through generic experimentation: *Pigments* (1937), *Retour de Guyane* (1938), *Veillées noires* (1943) and *Black-Label* (1956). In doing so, it also advances scholarship on Damas (1912–1978) in two ways. On the one hand, it undertakes the crucial and in-depth research needed to challenge the understanding of Négritude as a bipartite (Césaire and Senghor) phenomenon. On the other hand, it offers an innovative reading of Damas whose work deserves more complete consideration than it has received thus far. Reading this essay will illuminate Damas's works and their relationship to one another, thus demonstrating the continuity of Damasian Négritude. F. Bart Miller holds a PhD in French Studies from the University of Liverpool. Henri Pourrat (1887-1959) was a French writer and folklore collector. His TRÉSOR DES CONTES (Treasury of Tales), still in print, contains some 1,000 tales. Part One of this book covers his life, his work, and the factors that affected the reception of his folktale collection. Part Two presents (in translation) eight tales together with their oral field versions, goes on to discuss more generally Pourrat's sources, and closes with a discussion of seven of his tales in comparison with the Perrault tales from which they are ultimately derived. Part Three is a selection of seventy-three tales from LE TRÉSOR DES CONTES. (This selection differs from the one published in 1989 under the title FRENCH FOLKTALES.)

Excerpt from Biographical Notice of Joseph Le Conte I predict that this autobiography will take high rank among publication of its class. Much of my information is derived from this source; and I shall endeavor, as far as possible, to let Prof. Le Conte's own words speak for him, since they will paint a picture better than any that I could outline.

Joseph Le Conte was born Feb. 26, 1823, at Woodmanston plantation, Liberty county, Georgia. His father's family were Huguenots, and traced their ancestry back to Guillaume Le Conte, born in Rouen, France, in 1659, who left Rouen in 1686, just after the revocation of the Edict of Nantes, and settled in New Rochelle. One of his descendants, William, took a prominent part in the revolutionary movement in Georgia. He was a member of the "First Council of Safety" in 1775, and was on the so-called "Black List" of "those Rebel Councillors," prepared by Sir James Wright and sent to King George III. The second son of William, John Eaton Le Conte, was born in 1730. He had three sons: William, who died without issue; Louis, the father of Professor Joseph, the subject of this sketch, and of Professor John Le Conte, the physicist; and John Eaton, the father of John L. Le Conte, the distinguished naturalist. Louis, the father of Joseph, was born in New York in 1782. He graduated at Columbia College, and then studied medicine, the better to care for the slaves on his father's plantation. He returned, at the age of 28, to Liberty county, which was a Puritan colony, and very orthodox and exclusive. In 1813, he

married Anne Quartermain, one of these Puritans, and a refined and lovely woman. They had four sons and three daughters, of whom Joseph was the fifth child and youngest son. Two of these sons died in early manhood, and both of the others became distinguished men. Joseph's mother died when he was only three years old, and he was brought up by his father with the most tender care. This father was a very remarkable man: a good physician, a skillful chemist and naturalist, a great hunter, fond of all manly sports, and a passionate lover of nature. Israel Pelletier argues that "Trois contes" demands a different kind of reading which distinguishes it from "Madame Bovary" and other Flaubert texts. By the time he wrote this late work, Flaubert's attitude toward his characters and the role of fiction had changed to accommodate different social, political, and literary pressures. He constructed two opposing levels of meaning for each of the stories, straight and ironic, which produced a more fruitful way of

addressing some of his concerns and assumptions about language and illusion. Included in this study are a provocative feminist reading of "Un Coeur," an assessment of "Saint Julien" as Flaubert's attempt to come to terms with his originality as a writer, and an interpretation of "Herodias" as an autobiography of the writing process.
